As I write this column at the end of November 2023, we are still waiting on

a decision from the NMRA on which city will be hosting the NMRA National Convention and the National Train Show in 2026.

Last Spring, I began the process of reviewing convention and hotel space and during the summer meeting with the convention center and hotel representatives about booking the center and hotel room requirements. After numerous emails and phone calls I was able to determine preliminary costs along with convention center facility space and date requirements. Once I gathered the information, I was instructed to hand it off to NMRA person in California that negotiates contracts with convention centers and hotels.

The SER is not involved with any negotiations or decisions the NMRA makes with the Convention Center or the Hotels and is not privy to contracts the NMRA signs with the facilities in host cities, which removes the SER from any liability for expenses for the convention center, guarantees for hotel room requirements, and the National Train Show operations. The SER is only responsible for the day-to-day operations of the convention.

The person negotiating the contracts notifies the NMRA Board whether he approves of the SER hosting the convention, and they will in turn vote as to whether the SER may host the convention. This may not take place until the NMRA National Board of Directors meeting at the Amherst Railway Society Railroad Hobby show January 27 & 28 in West Springfield, Massachusetts. Once the event is approved by the NMRA Board of Directors then NMRA President Gordy Robinson will announce which city will be hosting the 2026 National Convention. If we get the convention, it will be full speed ahead.

After talking with other convention chairs, I have found, as they have, that it's a long and difficult process when considering hosting a national convention. There are a lot more contracts and legal issues that must be resolved than in hosting a regional convention. The delay by the NMRA in deciding is a cause for concern. Normally planning for a National Convention takes 3 to 5 years and 2026 will be here before we know it.

Scale Trains will be our major sponsor for the convention. And I've talked to the Tennessee Valley Railroad Museum, and they will run special trains for attendees. And I've asked the Southern and L&N Historical societies to hold their conventions at the TVRM during our convention and open their archives to convention attendees.

And we have a logo for the convention! I worked with our friends at Scale Trains to design what I think is the perfect logo for our convention. *SER*

I hope this issue of The SouthErneR finds your family and you well and virus free. Also hope your division is doing

something. My wife and I were able to attend the SER convention this past September and sat through some nice clinics. They were well presented and enjoyable. Hope I remember to review the handouts again, as there were some good tips. We also visited 8 layouts. What a variety they were. We enjoyed something from each one. I don't think we saw everything in the bigger ones. It is so nice that the hosts were open for us to see their work. I do take photos of what I find the most interesting. See my convention report on page 8.



Nice to learn how those scenery containers get filled up. I learned the process at Albert Churella's layout. If you didn't attend the convention, you missed a good one. Please consider attending one soon, it will be lots of fun. You get to learn and see a lot over the long weekend. Besides visiting with your friends and maybe making new ones.

I have been working on model kit #1008 from Plastruct which is a refinery. This is not a "shake the box" kit. It is hard to

do but has been enjoyable after I figured out each step.



One issue I had to

Yes, I put the bottle to the bottom of the pan and bent the supports I had already glued on. So, I replaced them with new ones. But the railing retained the curve after the rubber bands were removed. The posts were now straight up and down with no flare of the top of the railing at the open ends.

I then tried just the railing piece. As you might be able to see there is a small bend, say around 10 o'clock on the railing. This happened because the railing was just 1/16" too long, overlapping itself around the bottle; the bottle must have expanded some, the railing ends slipping next to each other, the rubber band kept them flush to the bottle when it shrank back to its size. Making the horizontal rails bow out some. Keep that in mind if you try this. Try to have at least 1/4" between the ends of the item wrapped around a plastic

container. The other platform for this tower was not a full circle either, so I cut it to fit, and the bend was not used.



Then on this tank I had

glued a 2-section railing to the platform edge, and you can see the top rail is straight. So, I took a scrap piece of wood, put the radius on for the platform edge and rubber banded a new 2-section railing to the curved edge of wood and put it in hot water for 20 seconds. The piece held the curve of the platform as you see. Very happy, I remembered enough about the hot water process to use it.

Here is where I am with the refinery project now.

deal with was curved railings on some of the

platforms. In the photo below, you see the flat railing provided by Plastruct. I remembered learning that if you heat up the plastic in hot water, it will retain the new shape, if you can bend and hold it for a short time. I had already tried to glue the railing on the curved platform, but the top of the railing flares out at the ends. I found a pill bottle the same diameter as the platform, slipped



it on the bottle and put the rubber band


on. Fold it once, so 2 bands around the railing to keep it flat against the bottle side. In a small pan half filled with water, I heated it up to almost a boil.

Then I turned the burner off, placed the bottle with the railing banded around it for 20/30 seconds.

# SER 2023 Convention article and photos by Chuck Higdon



Then seeing a familiar building kit assembled differently in a nice setting is also a treat. So here are some of the photos I took during the convention tours.

We visited Gary Fish on Thursday night (#1 & 2).





Friday, we visited Arnold Eaves N scale layout. Nice size layout with lots of nice scenes (#1, 2, 3, 4 & 5).



Then we stopped by Albert Churella's layout. It's On2 representing the Sandy River and Rangeley Lakes line.

Being O gauge, the details are larger and easier to see and work with. It is a large railroad and set up for operations with older styled phones for communication (#6). Nice touch with them. A large layout in several rooms. The room separation adds a distance sense to the layout.



The Aspen trees always seem to brighten up a scene (#19).


















Then there is Steve Austin's Elkhorn Iron & Timber Company Railroad layout which has more forest than the prairies of Colorado.

# THE 2024 SER CONVENTION June 20 to 23

In simple terms, the Achievement Program (AP) is a travel guide, to help you on your journey through the world of model railroading. The AP also provides incentive to learn and master the many crafts and skills necessary in the hobby of model railroading. With the completion of each category, you will be issued a certificate acknowledging your achievement.

The AP requirements are a set of standards, but they can also serve as a set of guideposts for those who are new, near-new, and not-so-new to the hobby. Not because they lead to some sort of official pat-on-theback, but because they are a source of ideas for projects that can help us learn to become better modelers.

Briefly, the AP is a system of requirements for demonstrating a superior level of skill in various aspects of our hobby. It covers not only building various types of models, but also building other things which are important to the hobby, such as scenery, structures, track work, and wiring. It also recognizes service to the hobby and the NMRA, which are important as well.

#### Master Model Railroader (MMR)

An NMRA member qualifies as an MMR when one has obtained at least seven of the eleven Achievement Certificates provided that one has earned at least one Certificate in each of the four areas of the Regulations. Earning the title of MMR is the ultimate goal for many participants in the Achievement Program.

The 11 Achievement Program Awards by the 4 Categories are:

- 1. Model Railroad Equipment Master Builder Motive Power Master Builder Cars
- 2. Settings Master Builder Scenery Master Builder Structures Master Builder Prototype Models
- 3. Engineering and Operation Model Railroad Engineer—Civil Model Railroad Engineer—Electrical Chief Dispatcher
- 4. Service to the Hobby Association Official Association Volunteer Model Railroad Author

To qualify for the Master Model Railroader status, you must earn 7 of the above awards with the stipulation that at least one award must be earned in each of the 4 categories.

Some people may be reluctant to participate in the AP, because the rules seem difficult to understand. The website pages explain each of the different categories in the AP and the requirements.

#### **Golden Spike Award**

If you are new to the AP, may we recommend that you take a look at the Golden Spike Award, although not an actual AP category its requirements are structured along the same lines. Further Information is available at www.nmra.org. *SER*

## Kennecott Copper Mill article and photos by Tim Chandler

My name is Tim Chandler.

To begin, my brother Barry Chandler is responsible for the model of the Kennecott Copper Mill in Alaska. He has been working on it for over two years. The back half of the mill was recently installed. Barry lives in Charlotte, NC.

He retired this year from Home Depot but continues to work as a private contractor doing home repair and remodeling. He constructed a few other buildings on my layout, but the majority of his effort has been constructing the Kennecott Mill using blueprints I obtained from the national archives.

The mill exists and was designated as a National Historic Landmark in 1986 (www.nps.gov/wrst/learn/historyculture/ kennecott-mines-national-historic-landmark.htm). The research I did indicates the historic nature of the model, which makes it even more impressive.


I retired from the U.S. Nuclear Regulatory Commission in 2018, following a 42-year career in the military and commercial nuclear fields. I enjoy playing golf and am very active in my church as well as in the Kairos Prison Ministry. My wife Maria and I retired to a small lake house on Lake Murray near Columbia, SC.

While researching various concepts I could use for a model railroad, I found pictures of the Kennecott Copper Mill, which led me to the discovery of the Copper River & Northwestern Railway.


#### The CR&NW railway ran from the

port of Cordova, Alaska to the Kennecott Mill from 1912 to 1938. Since the CR&NW railway had such a rich history, along with several significant structures and landmarks that I could use as layout design elements, I decided to use the CR&NW railway as the basis for my model railroad. Obviously, the Kennecott Mill would be the centerpiece of the layout.

The layout is a free-lanced prototypical layout since the actual railway ceased operation in 1938, and I model


operations in 1952. This allowed me to use both steam and early diesel locomotives, and also allowed me to expand the number of activities on the railway. All the track on the layout has been laid and all the major structures have been installed. I have just begun adding scenery and backdrops to the layout. My goal is to start hosting operating sessions by the end of the year.














Mid South Division will be hosting the 2024 SER Convention in Decatur, Alabama next June 20-23. Mid South is not a large division, but




Our recent clinics for members and public walkins have covered developing 3D ".stl" files from



Jack Varadi and Steve Todd facilitated an online session on Tuesday August

8. Eighteen division members participated. The four presentations and their topics were: Rich Lehman – Benchwork Under Construction for an HO Atlantic Coast Line and Sea Board Airline Railroad in the 1960s; Rick Mazur – Constructing a workbench using lumber from dismantled benchwork from a layout; Bruce Gathman – constructing 2-foot gage model railroad freight cars; and Steve Todd – Expanding his N-Scale home Layout. Following each presentation time was allotted for questions of which there were many. Future similar events are in the planning stage.

On the morning of September 30, Chuck Jenkins and Jack Varadi presented a clinic on weathering freight cars. The clinic covered some simple techniques that can be used to lightly weather rolling stock. Ten division members attended the event and were provided an un-weathered 50' HO boxcar shell, weathering powders, weathering washes, and gloves, brushes, etc. for them to use. In addition, the attendees brought one of their own freight cars to be weathered. Participants (#1) went home with their weathered boxcar



shell, their own weathered freight car and an assortment of weathering powders and washes. Funds received as a result of being awarded a NMRA matching division member retention grant helped make this event a big success.

The division participated in the Greer, SC annual Railfest on September 30. The division had its expanded Modular T-Trak HO layout (#2) operating at the event along with a staffed NMRA table. Over 400 men, women and children attended the day's activities and the division obtained four new NMRA members through the NMRA Armed Forces one-year free membership program.

The division Modular T-Trak HO layout (#2) continues to

serve as a "shining star" of the division. It continues to be operated at train shows and has not only been enjoyed by hundreds of attendees but has also served as one of the excellent ways of showcasing the Pal-



metto Division. This has also been a great team building activity for those members participating.

The Fall division meeting was held on October 14 at Northgate Baptist Church in Greenville (#3) with 44 members were in attendance. The day's activities began with a clinic "Making Rocks from Ceiling Tiles" presented by Dave Winans followed by a summary of the activities that took place at the "Freight Car Weathering clinic, which included brief descriptions by many of the clinic attendees showing examples of their work. In addition, Steve Todd gave a recap on the two clinics he conducted on DCC-EX. Both he and Chuck encouraged the attendees to participate and lead future clinics.

Finally, Roger reported that the spring division meeting will most likely take place at the remolded Central, SC railroad station at a date to be announced, and the summer division meeting also at a date and location to be determined.

The morning events concluded with a short business meeting which included reports from the Superintendent, Trea-



surer and updates on the free military membership program by Ken Majchrzak, "What's on Your Workbench" initiative by Jack Varadi and Division T-Trak layout

by Dave Winans. Finally, the three contest winners were selected as follows: Popular Model –  $1^{st}$  place – Scott Lister,  $2^{nd}$  place – Marcus Weller; Photograph – Steve Todd; and Tips and Techniques – Jack Varadi. The day's events concluded with a visit to two operating layouts – Les Ills Cajon Pass Santa Fe and Southern Pacific HO layout and Bruce Swift Short Line and Rio Grande layout.

Hey y'all! A lot has been going on in the Bluff City Division since the last writeup. On August 31, we had a meet and greet with Scale


