It's official! The Southeastern

Region of the National Model Railroad Association will be hosting the 2026 NMRA National Convention and National Train Show in Chattanooga, Tennessee!

On January 26, 2024, the NMRA Board of Directors voted 9-0 to award the 2026 National Convention to the SER and to be held in Chattanooga. So, it's full steam ahead for the 2026 Scenic City Express!

The NMRA National Convention will be held July 27 – August 2, 2026, at the Chattanooga Convention Center located in downtown Chattanooga. There are 4 hotels either attached or within a 5-minute walk of the Convention Center that will be providing special rates to attendees. The Marriott is attached to the Convention Center and Read House, The Chattanoogan, and Hotel Bo are within 2 blocks of the Convention Center.

When it comes to finding a place to eat, downtown Chattanooga has plenty of restaurants to choose from. Plus, the Chattanooga Convention Center is one of the stops on the free shuttle buses that run about every 20 minutes from the area by the river to the Chattanooga Choo Choo so attendees will be able to hop on the shuttle and hop off at shops and restaurants along the way.

Chattanooga is within a day's drive of over 4,400 NMRA members. One of the major factors in members deciding to attend the NMRA National Conventions is the travel expense. Chattanooga is the center of easy access for travelers coming by Interstate Highways through Nashville, Knoxville, Birmingham, Atlanta and from points around the US. Current updates to the Interstates in Chattanooga will be completed in 2025.

We are projecting that over 900 attendees could be attending the convention, but Jenny at HQ thinks it could be over 1,200. With lower travel, lodging, and dining expenses that Chattanooga has to offer over cities home to millions of

people where the national convention has always been held, we could see a large turnout especially with all

the events we are planning, and all the tourist-related activities the Chattanooga area has to offer visitors.

We are honored that ScaleTrains will be the major sponsor for our convention. I also reached out to the Southern Railway Historical Association and the L&N Historical Society; they are planning to hold their conventions at the Tennessee Valley Railroad Museum (TVRM) during our convention and will open their archives to our convention attendees.

On February 6, 2024. I met with the Operations and Scheduling Managers at the TVRM along with Mike Cummings, SER Member and NMRA Secretary, and Shane Wilson, President of ScaleTrains, to discuss private trains reserved for convention attendees.

We are delighted that the TVRM will provide the following trains and activities for our convention:

- A Dinner Train on Tuesday and Wednesday evenings. Ninety-six (96) passengers can be on each train. Tickets would be sold on first come basis during registration.
- ScaleTrains will charter the Summerville Double-headed Steam Special on Thursday with the 4501 and possibly with a locomotive the TVRM has been restoring which will eventually be heading to its home at a museum down south after the convention. This would be an unusual locomotive for Chattanooga. The Steam Special can carry 240 people with lunch under a tent in Summerville for the passengers. This train trip tickets will also be sold on a first come basis.
- The TVRM Hiwassee River Rail Loop train will run on Friday. It's a 4.5-hour train trip for around 200 people.
- As part of the non-rail activities the TVRM has a Homefront Tea Room that holds 50 people, and it will be set up for 11:00 AM to 2:00 PM. Also first come during registration.

- The TVRM Missionary Ridge Local operates every half-hour and convention attendees will ride with other guests of the TVRM. Convention attendees will be given a special back shop tour of the TVRM shops where the really heavy railroad shop machines are used.
- TVRM may also have a blacksmith demonstration and a WWII Army Camp reenactment group with equipment for guests to enjoy.
- TVRM Night Photo Shoot Event will be limited to 50 attendees that lasts for a 75 minutes.

In addition to all the above, Chattanooga has the Incline Railway up Lookout Mountain, Riverboat cruise on the Tennessee River, Rock City, Ruby Falls, Point Park, the Tennessee Aquarium and many other attractions. We will also be planning bus tours of Chickamauga Battlefield, the nation's oldest and largest National Military Park. The Battle of Chickamauga was the 2nd bloodiest battle of the Civil War where over 35,000 were killed, wounded, missing, or captured.

Besides all the above activities, at the Chattanooga Convention Center, we will have great clinicians from around the country giving clinics from Monday through Saturday. Then capped by over 100,000 sq. ft. of model trains will be the National Train Show on Saturday and Sunday that will be open to the public.

So, save the date, July 27 – August 2, 2026, plan on attending a great convention planned and carried out by members of your Southeastern Region! SER

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

something. I have finished the refinery kit project I was working on. I have asked my Division AP Chair to go over it and see if it meets the requirements for the Structure Achievement award. This would be my first structure for that goal.



I am going to go over the paperwork and will put that together next. As I expect you have heard, don't overthink the process, just provide what is asked for. Once you do one or two, they will get easier. Time will tell.






I have also made some progress on this project. I cut some brick walls, filled the area with pink foam and then white glued the coal. Glued it to the styrene piece. Now for some grass, dirt, and weeds. Then I can work on the oil tank version.

With weeks of very cold weather, remember the added heating may have dried your train room and the wood shrank some. But then the rain we had a few weeks later would have expanded the wood and some of the rail kinks are back to normal.

While I did have some new wavey track sections, I did not mark them to cut a 1/16" in the rail needed to straighten out the rail. As the wood has now expanded back to before the super cold the waves are gone, and I am not sure where to add the gap. But somewhere in the area should prevent the wavey part next time.

If you have a topic that I may be able to help with or if you have a clinic you want to present to the region, please let me know. We can set up a webinar to show it. The SER does have the Zoom accounts we can use for presentations, discussions, or meetings should the need arise. I am also looking for topics and presenters for more Webinars, please let me know at vze5crrw1@outlook.com if you would like to present one or know someone that would.

The Reading and Southern

Admittedly an odd or at least unlikely railroad, I decided sometime around the mid-nineties to do something with my Southern Railway. I got as far as scratch-building the Spencer locomotive shop before we moved and had a home built with a 2,200 square foot basement. We live in Blythewood, SC, about ten miles north of Columbia.

I had the space divided into three rooms and a full bath. A work room of approximately 500 square feet is a luxury I decided upon.

The other two rooms are a 26x26 space and a 42x16-1/2 square foot space. These two rooms have an eight-foot-wide permanent opening between them.

The idea was to simulate the Southern between Spencer and South Carolina destinations.

I put in all the bench work, open frame L-girder and had two large peninsulas in the 26 by 26 room and a roughly three foot around the wall, with two significant peninsulas reaching out from the wall into the 16-1/2x42 foot room. Track passed through the walls to connect both rooms.

The railroad would be anchored by sizable yards (Andy Sperendeo freight yard book) at each end in the 26x26 room. Point-to-point or continuous operation are both feasible.

Then, while on a visit to my hometown in Pennsylvania, my dad took me to the remains of the Saucon Yards of the

Reading Railways in Bethlehem, adjacent to Hellertown, where I grew up.

Many photos and stretches of a 100foot tape measure later, the Reading between Quaker-

town, PA

and the imagined Bethlehem works of the so-named steel company became part of my railway.

Because of the configuration of the two rooms and the benchwork already installed, I can have two railroads - the Southern operating on one 26x8 peninsula and through the 42x16 room and the Reading, on a 7x26 peninsula.



The stone, two story building is Hellertown Borough Hall as dedicated on July 4, 1942. The building was originally the Detweiler House built in 1818. It was reduced by about 30% in size when it was renovated as the Borough Hall. Scratch built by Tony Ratola.

The presumption of my layout is that I have two distinct railroads, the Southern and the Reading. The Reading on my layout is an actual reproduction running between Quakertown and Bethlehem, PA.

The Southern will be partly authentic between points in SC, but also partly a stretching of my imagination to incorporate favorite historic buildings in Columbia which I am scratch building as pretty accurate copies of the originals.

With the two hidden tracks installed, the Southern and Reading can also be connected and operated as one, call it "imagined" railway.

I have dropped the idea of Spencer and the Southern is entirely within South Carolina with only off- the-layout connections to North Carolina.

All buildings are virtually exact representations of 100+ year old buildings, except for the Saucon Yards boiler house, slightly modified to fit the layout.

I want to acknowledge my good friends; Walt Mazzei who provided much guidance and assistance on things, operational, electrical and electronics; Lawrence Hannahan, who is installing lighting in dozens of structures and particularly Tony Ratola, a master model builder who has scratch built and major kit-bashed dozens of structures, as well as doing excellent scenery. When I wonder if I'll ever see light at the end of the tunnel, Tony is there with his lantern.

Although free-lance, it incorporates scratch-built representations of about twenty structures on, or "would have been" eligible for, the National Register of Historic places, unfortunately those "would have been" were demolished before they could be saved. I would prefer to describe the free-lance aspect of operations in person-to-person conversations.

Overall, there are over 100 structures, about 40% scratch built and the rest craftsman kits or major kit-bash.

The layout, 1,304 square feet in my basement, is one level. Though I've never measured total trackage, I am sure it is more than 1,000 feet, with well over 100 turnouts.

Track height varies from about 42 to 51 inches: Minimum radius is 34" and maximum grade is about 1.25%; longest potential mainline run is about 200 feet. It can be operated point to point or continuous.

There is still a lot of work to be done. I plan to change out most of my fascia switches.

I have been told by a couple model railroad friends that my HO Scale railroad is far enough along to be considered for the *SouthErneR* and that the short-written descriptions they'd read made them wonder how it could be, but on seeing it they thought it worked very well.


Bingen Station on the Reading. A rural agricultural stop which took some of the area folks to and from the huge Bethlehem Steel plant in Bethlehem, PA, built in 1850, demolished circa 1940s. Scratch built by John.



Adluh Flour cornmeal, grits and flour mill in the Vista entertainment district in downtown Columbia. Still producing those products, though the front section is now a restaurant. Built in 1911 as Columbia Grain and Provision Company. On the National Register of historic places. 623 scale feet long, scratch-built by Tony Ratola and John.

Under construction is the South Carolina Railroad freight and passenger depot, initially built between 1850 and 1853. Burned in the Civil War, the main two story passenger depot and offices and part of the freight station survived. Rebuilt in later 1800's and briefly served as a Southern Railway facility, also on the National Register. Scratch-building in progress by John.

Adluh Flour gave us access to photo and measure all buildings. Similarly, the SC Depot was photographed and measured by John.



The Guignard Brick Works was built by the Guignard family in 1801 across the Congaree River from Columbia. By the middle of the Twentieth Century, approximately 1/2 the bricks in buildings in Downtown Columbia were manufactured here.

The brickyard is on the National Register of Historic Places and is now a small National Park, open to the public. Buildings are scratchbuilt by Tony Ratola and John, based on photos and on-site measurements.

Kilns are kit-bashed Walthers kits, simulating the 4 kilns operated and located in virtually the exact relative location to each other and all structures.



Industrial District in upstate SC, representation only, 1/2 craftsman kits, 1/4 kitbash, 1/4 scratch built.







The house that is half stone-half clapboard is the Boehm House, the first home in Hellertown, built in 1747.












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Scratch building Dewey Fire station by Tony Ratola

The Dewey Fire station was built in 1900 as a result of a devastating fire in 1898 that destroyed many commercial buildings as well as the Christ Union Church in Heller-

town PA. My friend, John Kelchner, thought it would be a great addition to his HO scale Reading and Southern Model Railroad. Although the building is still standing, many of the original features have been removed and renovated so that it is unrecognizable from the original.

Scratch building the structure began in November 2022



using a black and white photo of the building found in the book (1), "Images of America - Hellertown" by Lee A. Weidner with the Hellertown Historical society. There were a couple of images on line as well.

Original dimensions were calculated by enlarging the photo and counting bricks to figure out the height of the front left corner of the building. All other dimensions were calculated from that, which gave us a very good approximation

of the height of the structure, sizes for the doors, windows and main opening. Part of the overall footprint was taken from online Sanborn maps.

The façade (2) of the building began by modifying Design Preservation wall sections (3) to the correct height of the

building. Detailed brick work around the arched doors and top circular details are all Rail Scale products cut to



fit, and super glued to the wall sections.

Brick detail above the main entrance and for the diamond patterns on the second floor were individually cut from resin brick sheet and attached

to the wall sections. Diamond patterns were masked off and painted separately. The top curved roof line was made from individual strips of Evergreen plastic. I used Tichy train parts for the doors and modified the 2nd floor arched windows to fit.

Side walls were constructed in a similar manner using Design Preservation wall sections cut to the correct size and brick paper trimmed and attached to represent the stepped top of the walls. Completion of the side walls. Rosin brick paper was glued to card stock with the DPM sections attached. Each window was cut out separately and constructed using Evergreen strip and final brick detail added. All windows had acetate attached after the sections were painted

Final paint color was a mix of Tamiya Brown and Earth and Brick Red (4 & 5).

Front and sides start to take shape

Final details include downspouts made from scrap tubing and decorative finials on front wall. Some liberty was taken on the installation of the roof siren and bell tower as there was no



clear picture as to their actual dimensions. Part of them can be seen from the original photo so that a likeness of both could be replicated from scraps of plastic. The other

side wall is an exact duplicate of the one that could be seen and the rear of the building was our own layout but replicated the style of the original.

I feel it is a good representation of the original. Or in other words, not bad from a single black and white pho-

to. Total time for construction was 3 months of evenings and it turned out well. It now sits proudly in Hellertown on the Reading and Southern Railroad.





Tony Ratola scratch built the Park Hotel with its 73 windows. Tony says the owner who built the building in 1872 had a brother in law who sold windows and unloaded what he had left, despite their configuration. Notice from the picture that, despite the fact that the windows are the same size, top of window frames on the first floor are straight, on the second floor A-frame, the third floor in three parts and the fourth floor again straight. Tony cut each window to match the original building. He also cut 140 individual corbels, or trim, at the roof line.



Todd Mill and Wild Creek Railroad

The objective of my railroad is to integrate heavy mainline railroading, branch line railroading and narrow gauge into a coherent transportation system. The Todd Mill and Wildcat Creek Railroad is a branch line railroad branching off of the Union Pacific.

At the end of the standard gauge branch, the terrain gets more rugged, so the extension is narrow gauge. In photo 1, the branch line, Todd Mill and Wildcat Creek Railroad, is crossing over the mainline Union Pacific. Both steam locomotives are from Broadway Limited.

In photo 2, the narrow gauge portion of the Todd Mill and Wildcat Creek Railroad is climbing a 3% grade past the Wildcat Creek Unobtainium Mine. Unobtainium is a critical element for the manufacture of perpetual motion machines. The Unobtainium mine is a Campbell kit. The locomotive is from Blackstone.

Photo 3 - Cheyenne Union Station. It serves the Union Pacific, but the Great Northern (I like their passenger paint scheme) also comes through Cheyenne. The branch line also has passenger service from this station.

My wife, Ardis, painted the 85 foot long mural as the backdrop for my railroad. She is an excellent painter.

The railroad will be on the layout tour and an operating session at the 2024 River Rails SER convention in Decatur. There's lots more to see. SER

He went

into detail about the many styles of the trailers or wagons which were used in the carnival. Many of his HO vehicles are custom made and were 3D printed with custom paint and decals. A lot of thought, time and dedication went into the creation and publication of the book. It is a must read for any modeler.

In January we had an over the top presentation and clinic by Craig Brotman from Atlanta. Craig and a couple of his friends joined our meeting. Craig's presentation was on painting and weathering models in addition to some of his tricks of the trade. Craig is not a model railroader but his techniques certainly interested our division and visitors due to their realistic final results. Model railroaders historically start painting light and work dark with



weathering. Craig, on the other hand, starts models dark and lightens them up with paint and weathering for impressive results. His techniques are akin to many military diorama modelers. He showed step by

step how he gets his results and even demonstrated on some of the division members models which were brought. He introduced us to the AK Interactive line of products as well as others he uses and his methods for use. He demonstrated "rusting" various materials including styrene, cardboard, aluminum and paper type corrugated roofing and weathering them for a realistic appearance. Overall, it was one of the best clinics the SCD has had and we thank Craig for making this clinic memorable.


Our February meeting presentation was by our own John Stewart. John has been generous with his time and skills
