

Education Chuck Higdon Cherokee Division

I hope this issue of *The SouthErneR* finds your family, and yourself well and virus free. Also hope your division is doing something.

As I read through the August issue of the NMRA magazine and our President's article, I saw he

mentioned the Education Department had updated the beginning guides on the website. So, I decided to take a look at them. Reading them over, they look fresh and would be a good read for any of us.

Another section of the NMRA website is the "Edu Train." Once opened there is another link to many clinics on how to do things. More help there. So, there is quite a bit to look over on the website. Just as there is so much to see on You Tube. Very easy these days to learn about an issue you might be having trouble with. Of course, calling a friend or member of the NMRA would be a good way to get some help, too.

As I write this, I am preparing to host an operating session (Ops). It will include 4 operators that have never done Ops and one that has, but just on his layout. I am still hoping one more of my regular crew attends.

I have cleaned the layout, vacuumed the floor, have all the paperwork printed and ready to use. I did see a switch throw that is broken, so I will replace that next.

The session will have lots of questions, but by trying to run the session, each operator with gain confidence and experience. By the end of session, the goal will be to have everyone smiling from having a good time. There may be some mistakes along the way with so much to learn. That's OK it is part of learning the ropes.



Because I have a helix with switch machines in the middle to go off or get on the helix, each train has an instruction sheet to go along for the run. On the sheet is a space in front of each instruction that can be checked off. This is to help the operators from losing their places on the sheet. The sheet can be carried around on a clipboard and lan-




yard, so making each step is easy to do.


The instructions for the turnouts agree with the labels over the switch buttons. Lines 3 and 7 on the instructions.

Each area has a map with notes on it as well.

I was able to make the maps using Excel. They are a little crude, but work. The location descriptions agree with the waybills. It is important to have consistent names on the maps and waybills.



If you have a topic that I may be able to help with or if you have a clinic you want to present to the region, please let me know. We can set up a webinar to show it. The SER does have Zoom accounts that can be used for presentations, discussions or meetings, should the need arise. I am also looking for topics and presenters for more Webinars.

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From Your Achievement Program Manager

Tips and Understanding the Achievement Program Regulations by Randall V. Watson

In the Summer 2022 issue of the *SouthErneR* Achievement Program (AP) column, the Association Volunteer and Association Official Certificates were covered. Also, a brief explanation of the National Model Railroad Association achievement program and the four categories, along with a list of the eleven Certificates comprising the four categories in the AP. See the Summer 2022 issue of the SouthErneR for more information on the categories and eleven Certificates. An even better source is the NMRA website; under the Achievement Program, you will find tons of data on the AP. If you are new to the Achievement Program, I encourage you to check out the NMRA website (www.nmra.org.)

One of my long-time friends, Mr. Royal Bruce, who used to live in the Southeastern Region and was a member of my home division, moved to the Sunshine Region. We were discussing the National Model Railroad Association AP. I'm sure quite a few Southeastern Region members have heard that participating in the Achievement Program will make you a better modeler. However, Royal shared with me a more profound version. I quote Royal: "The NMRA Achievement Program helps you to become a more accomplished modeler and a better model railroader by guiding you through a learning process." That is one of the best definitions I have heard of the Achievement Program.

Now to cover another one of the AP Certificates: The **Chief Dispatcher Certificate**. When you hear Chief Dispatcher, what do you think of or what are your thoughts? Would your reply be running trains on your model railroad through rolling hills covered with trees and rocks, a city scene, and industrial buildings along the trackside? On the other hand, would you reply by operating my model railroad prototypically? If your response is to run your model railroad prototypically then the Chief Dispatcher Certificate is definitely for you. However, if you like watching your trains just running through the scenery, I would not recommend this certificate. However, operating your model railroad prototypically, as outlined in the Chief Dispatcher regulations, can be fun, challenging, or sometimes frustrating during an operation session.

The Advantages of Operating Groups

By joining an Operating Group or starting your own, you have opportunities to gain the experience and time you need to earn the Chief Dispatcher Certificate. In August 2006, I received my Chief Dispatcher Certificate because

I was a member of an active operating group. Some of the members had just started building their model railroad layout. Other members' layouts were near completion, so the group could begin operating sessions. When our Operating Group began, one significant advantage was we rotated each week to a different member's layout for a work session. Members' layouts were completed over time and operating sessions started. That was when the fun began.

Chief Dispatcher Regulations

Note: The regulations have three sections #1, #2 and #3. See ($example\ A$) on next page.

The regulations written in red, "To qualify for this certificate, you must:" which applies to all three sections. Therefore, I would encourage you to read the Regulations and Statement of Qualifications form more than once, even three times, before you begin to complete the Documentation.

- **#1.** "Have participated in the operation of a model railroad, either home or club, for not less than fifty hours. A minimum of ten hours each must have been served in three of the five categories listed below, one which must be #5, Dispatcher."
 - 1. Engineer (mainline freight, passenger, or way freight)
 - 2. Yardmaster (or station master)
 - 3. Hostler (or power desk)
 - 4. Towerman (or traffic manager, or roadmaster)
 - 5. Dispatcher

In the regulations, all five categories are described in more detail. Take time to read all of them.

Note: I received excellent documentation from Roy Masterson, our current SER President which will be used in this article.

- **#2.** "The applicant shall also do the following (please note the use of a computer to accomplish these requirements is acceptable)."
- **a.** "Prepare a Schematic drawing of a model railroad layout meeting the operating conditions described in (#1) and indicating all pertinent simulated distances."

Tip: The Regulations require indicating all pertinent simulated distances on the Schematic drawing. See examples in the Photos below of Milepost markers distances; add these to your Schematic drawing.



Note: Normally, this would be a diagram of one layout you put in your qualifying time - but there is no requirement that it must be. The drawing must be neat and legible, but it does not have to be in ink or generated by a computer. See the examples in 1 and 2.



c. "Develop an operating train chart (graph) that interprets the schedule for timetable operation of the railroad. Indicate at least one meet on the schematic drawing required in (B-1). Show the position of the trains involved and describe the actions, giving pertinent time and movement data to affect the meet."

Note: Describing what happens in a train meet or meets is one of the most overlooked things often left out of the Chief Dispatcher Certificate Documentation I receive. Even on the Statement of Qualification Form (SOQ), section 2 check box three is a reminder of the documentation you need to submit. See example 4 below and 5 on page 10.



d. "Develop or adapt a system of operation for the layout in (#1), including all the necessary forms and explanations for their use for controllwwing car movements, train makeup, and operation in a prototypical manner."

Note: This section of the regulations requires numerous pieces of documentation that are necessary to be submitted. In the examples, only some of Roy's documentation were used. For example, I used only one Crew Order, there was one for each train. Also, the Cover for the Car Cards and Car Cards were on for each train.

Which system of operation you develop or adapt, car cards, train orders, switch list, or some other commercial software, be sure to include all the forms you use. Also, take note of the regulations in section #2 documentation in the last paragraph; read this carefully. It covers club or home operating groups applying for the Chief Dispatcher Certificate that can use copies of **some** paperwork. See a few partial examples 6, 7 and 8 on pages 10 and 11.

TRAIN MEETS

As shown on the string diagram there are four train meets that have been identified. Except for passenger trains, freight trains heading South or West have superiority over North or East bound trains (Infenor) within the Cherokee Division. Passenger trains have priority over freight trains within the Cherokee Division regardless of the direction of travel. But westbound passenger trains have superiority over eastbound passenger trains.

At meeting points, the inferior train must take the siding and clear the main. If necessary, the inferior train may have to back into a siding to clear the main.

TRAIN MEET #1 02:30 AM

D-H-450 is an eastbound grain train on Main 2 in double track territory between Scottsboro and Bridgeport Alabama. The Dispatcher has scheduled a train meet at MP400.5. D-H-450 is instructed to hold West and clear of the switch where Main 2 rejoins Main 1. H-D-401 is a west bound coal train occupying Main 1 and enroute to Memphis and will proceed at normal track speed. Once H-D-401 is past the Dispatcher will give D-H-450 permission to proceed.

TRAIN MEET #2 14:30 PM

H-D-503 is a westbound mixed freight on the arrival track in Citico Yard where the yard crew is pulling a block of cars and adding new cars to the train. D-H-502 is an eastbound freight train and has been instructed by the Yardmaster to wait on the freight main West of the Yard Limit. H-D-503 cross over to the passenger main and proceed to Memphis. After H-D-503 clears the yard and heading West the D-H-502 will be instructed to enter the yard and stop on the arrival track.

TRAIN MEET #3 14:30 PM

H-D-503 is a westbound mixed freight instructed to hold on the freight main short of the switch at MP 343.5 in Tiftonia, TN and east of the Tennessee River bridge. SOU 4 is an eastbound passenger train and after crossing the Tennessee River will enter the Passenger Main in Tittonia and perform a station stop at the depot. H-D-503 will be instructed to proceed after the passenger train has cleared the switch.

TRAIN MEET #4 17:00 PM

SOU 4 is a eastbound passenger train that has been instructed to cross over to the freight main at MP 340.5 from the passenger main and proceed to the passenger stallon in Chattanooga holding the freight main at the stallon. SOU 3 is a westbound passenger train from Clincinnati, Ohio and is occupying the passenger main at the station. After SOU 4 arrives the SOU 3 can proceed west on the passenger main per the timetable.

- **#3.** Statement of Qualification "The applicant must submit a completed Statement of Qualification (SOQ) (PDF file if possible) which shall include the following."
- 1. The forms and drawings meeting the requirements in #2.
- 2. Description of the jobs and number of hours in each.
- **3**. The signed witnessed "Certification of Operation" shows that all the requirements have been met, and the applicant has operated a model railroad in a prototypically manner.

The Chief Dispatcher SOQ Form ("A"on page 9) contains five (5) pages. Let's look at each page.

Page #1 Top Part - Member's Name, Address, NMRA Number, Expiration Date, etc. I refer to it as housekeeping. Complete all blanks, and **please print legibly**.

Note: Above section one it states – To qualify for this Certificate, you must:

1: Must have participated in operating one or more model railroads, either home or club, for no less than fifty hours. A minimum of ten hours must be served in three (3) of the five categories listed, one of which **must be DISPATCHER**. You may have more than ten (10) hours in the three categories; that is to say, the remainder of twenty (20) hours can be in the three categories or any of the other categories, your choice. Accumulating time on more than one model railroad is acceptable, having at least two mainline trains plus yard switching in simultaneous operation. Some freight and passenger train systems, car movements, and road switching can control train activity.

SOUTHERN RAILWAY - CHEROKEE DIVISION OPERTAING INFORMATION

The Southern Railway — Cherokee Division is an HO scale double-deck point-to-point layout with a 230' mainline that was built for operations. The layout is set in the 1970's and occupies 3 rooms of my basement. Trains run from Harriman, Tennessee to Decatur, Alabama. There are 7 staging tracks in Harriman and Decatur and towns on the layout are towns on the prototypical Southern Railway between the two destinations. Photos of all the towns on the Cherokee Division are included along with a drawing of the railroad. The track plan includes industries for switching (red) and non-rail served buildings (black). A double track helix is located halfway between the staging yards of Harriman and Decatur.

The layout is built along the walls and bench work is 13" to 36" deep. The lower level is 38" high and the up level is 53" high. Mainline radius is generally 36" with a few curves with a tighter radius. Turnouts are #5 or #6 PECO Electofrog. Track is code 83, but the staging yards and the helix are code 100. Maximum grade in the 4.5 turn helix is 1.5%. The outside radius in the helix is 35.5" and the inside radius is 33.5". Each side of the helix contains 50' of track creating a very long passing track. One interesting feature of the helix is that the town of Scottsboro is located on the top of the helix and has a major industry and a team track. A switcher is stationed on a drill track. When a dispatcher (located in the helix) is on duty they must pull and spot cars along with dispatching duties. Located inside the bottom of the helix is a reversing loop from Bridgeport that can be used to turn trains or spot cars during switching.

1	If the Dispatcher is not on duty, consult with Superintendent for permission to move, clearance to next check point and need to occupy main.
2	To acquire locomotives enter the locomotive number on NCE throttle and press "Select", DCC address is same as road number on locomotive. Consist number is highest numbered locomotive. For engines with sound please select 8 on throttle to start primemover and 0 to turn on lights.

Four (4) checkboxes are used to ensure you have all the Documentation required in the Chief Dispatcher Regulation. Therefore, be sure you supply everything needed per the Regulations.

Note: Be sure you read the regulations and checkboxes more than once.


3: Submit a completed Statement of Qualifications (SOQ) which include the following: They are three (3) checkboxes in this section to use as a reference. Read each one carefully to ensure you supply everything needed.

Page #2 Job Descriptions of all ten (10) categories you can accumulate time (*example B*).

Review each title and job description on page #2 before completing the form on page #3 to ensure you have all the necessary time in the category in which you operated.



- A.1 ENGINEER; PASSENGER OR FREIGHT shall run his or her train in a manner that simulates the prototype, following the rules of the model railroad being used, operating according to the signal system (if present) or by direct instruction of the Dispatcher.
- A.2 WAYFREIGHT ENGINEER will meet the requirements of Mainline Engineer. In addition, he or she shall perform all required switching with approval from the Dispatcher in a manner to not adversely affect the overall rationad schedule or operations.
- B.I YARDMASTER runs the freight yard. He or she makes up trains with the appropriate cars in the desired numbers to have trains ready when the timetable or Dispatcher requires them. Generally, the Yardmaster operates the switch engine but in a large yard could direct several yard engineers.
- B.2 STATIONMASTER is in charge of the passenger station and all passenger switching. He or she makes up trains with the appropriate consists so the trains are ready when the finetable and Dispatcher requires them. Terminating trains are broken down appropriately and the cars serviced and stored as needed. Through train switching is accomplished.
- C.1 HOSTLER shall run the engine facilities. He or she shall have each locomotive facing the correct direction, double headed or lashed up, ready for the Engineer to easily leave the engine area. Service to the locomotives shall be simulated. Returning locomotives are placed in their appropriate stalls or tracks. On layouts with advanced control systems, the Hostler can handle the assignment of locomotives to the appropriate Engineer's throttle.
- C.2 POWER DESK decides what is the correct motive power for each train and assigns throttle control to the motive power. When the assignment is finished, he or she returns the control of that motive power back to the Hostler throttle or to off.
- D.1 TOWERMAN operates one or more towers (control panels) on a layout. He or she sets up the appropriate route at the correct une under the direction of the timetable or Dispatcher. He or she reports train passings to the Dispatcher if required.
- D.2 TRAFFIC MANAGER determines which ears go and come from each industry, and the amount and location of traffic. He or she specifies the route and may create a computer program to do this automatically.
- D.3 ROAD MASTER is the operating session trouble-shooter and makes repairs. He or she keeps things moving smoothly. He or she can take track in and out of service.
- F. DISPATCHER coordinates all train movements, either by sequence, timetable and fast clock or other operating system.

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N-Scale Enthusiast N-Scale National Convention 2022 by Ed Tougaw - Cherokee Division

The 2022 N-Scale Enthusiast National N-Scale Convention was held at the Sheraton Music City in Nashville, TN from June 14 through June 19. Among those attending were approximately 640 enthusiasts of N-Scale from the USA and four other countries. The six-day convention was packed with activities for the attending N-Scalers and their families. While it was based at the Sheraton Music City, there were several activities off site. These included a bus ride to the Tennessee Valley Rail Museum in Chattanooga for a rail excursion, two days of local layout tours, and non-rail-road events including trips to the Musicians Hall of Fame, Lane Motor Museum, and a dinner cruise on the General Jackson Showboat.

Dick Ollendorf, one of the Co-Chairs of the event, took a few minutes from his busy schedule to give me some background and statistics of this year's convention. It is a "Traveling Convention" taking place in different locations with the site selection and planning process occurring years before the actual event. The search, interview, selection of the hotel can occur two to three years prior to the convention. Planning for this convention started in 2018 with the original planned date of 2020, unfortunately pandemic concerns caused it to be delayed until 2022.

This was the 28th National Convention dedicated to N-Scale sponsored by this group. It has been an annual event missing only the COVID years of 2020 and 2021. The first convention was held in 1992 and sponsored by N-Scale Collectors, the predecessor of the current organization, N-Scale Enthusiasts. The 2023 N-Scale Enthusiast National N-Scale Convention will be held In Reno, Nevada.

Dick emphasized that successful planning, preparation, and execution of an event like this requires the contributions of many other organizations and individuals. Volunteers are heavily relied upon, with local individuals and clubs utilized as "Go To" resources. People in the N-Rail organization and clubs are welcomed as part of the process. He emphasized that a motivating factor is the "People want to get together" and a lot of effort went into making this a family friendly event. The range of activities offered was the result of this goal.

Dick mentioned that the NSE Committee and directors learn something from every convention. One lesson learned this year was the need to improve communication on excursions when multiple vehicles are involved.

During the bus ride to Chattanooga, the air conditioning failed on one bus and there was no established means of notifying the other buses. Future multi-vehicle excursions will have a cell phone equipped guide on each vehicle tasked with communicating with the other vehicles in an emergency. This kind of analysis and corrective action serves to improve an already outstanding event.

Tuesday June 14 - TVRM Excursion and Tour sponsored by ScaleTrains

I was not able to attend this event, but according to my covert source, identified only as Ernest T. Bass, three buses containing about 170 N-Scale Enthusiasts arrived at the Tennessee Valley Rail Museum in Chattanooga at about 10:30am on Tuesday June 14.

Upon arrival they were greeted by Shane Wilson, President of ScaleTrains and his loyal crew. After a few words of welcome Shane announced the newest locomotive release in their Rivet Counter line, an EMD SD40-2.

Samples were on hand for everyone to view. These are beautifully detailed and packed with features. It looks like our friends at ScaleTrains have hit it out of the park again with this locomotive.

Next all attendees enjoyed a box lunch and had a chance to visit the TVRM model railroad under construction by the Tennessee Valley Model Railroaders, inc. Then it was "All Aboard" the Missionary Ridge Local pulled by the historic 2-8-2, SRR #4501 for the trip to the East Chattanooga Station and the TVRM back shops.

On the way a photo run-by was conducted, followed by a pass through a pre-Civil War tunnel that was dedicated in 1859. Upon arrival at East Chattanooga, they were able to see 4501 rotated 180 degrees on the turntable. Immediately after this, the N-Scalers toured the TVRM back shop where they were able to observe some of TVRM's active projects. Then it was time to reboard the local and return to TVRM Grand Junction to load on the buses for the trip back to Nashville.

Thanks again to Shane and all the others at ScaleTrains for sponsoring another great event!

Wednesday June 15 - Home Layout Tours #1 and Registration.

Another event I wasn't able to attend, but I understand the home layout tours were structured with a total of five layouts to be viewed. Each day would have designated layouts and there would be a morning tour and an afternoon tour of that selection. Two layouts would be visited on Wednesday and three would be viewed on Friday.

Registration went from 1:30pm to 5:30pm and included check-in for both the Live Auction and the Model Contest. The day closed out with a Welcome Reception sponsored by Micro-Trains Line. This gathering was also the N-Scale Enthusiast (NSE) members meeting.

Thursday June 16 - Museum tours, Modular layout set-up, Model Contest Viewing, and Live Auction At last, an event I was able to attend. Three spectacular

modular layouts were set-up, one for each of the N Trak, T-Trak and FreeMoN standards (#1, #2 & #3). These layouts filled two large conference rooms (N Trak and T-Trak) and the main entrance foyer (FreeMoN). Together these layouts contained over 260 modules ranging from







the whimsical to scale representations of actual places/eras and everything in between. I saw a dragon on a castle, a Star Wars theme park in the woods, Godzilla and King Kong facing off, the St. Louis Arch, and some of the abso-

lute best scenery work I've ever witnessed on all three types of modules. Great modeling by all involved. Some of my favorites were a 3D printed and fully lighted coal loader on an N Trak



module (#4), a T-Trak module of the New River Valley (#5)



and two FreeMoN modules, one with a bridge and water scene (#6) and the other an Appalachian River Valley (#7)





scene. Wonderful work by all parties involved.

All modular layouts were attractively presented, and trains were reliably operated from late Thursday afternoon, all day Friday, until late tear down Saturday afternoon. All of us who have done public shows know what an achievement that is to successfully accomplish. Congratulations to all involved.

Model contest viewing was available from 4:30 to 5:30. Live Auction item viewing was from 5:00pm to 6:00pm followed by the actual Live Auction beginning at 6:30pm.

Non-model railroading activities on this day included a Trip to the Musicians Hall of Fame and the Lane Motor Museum. All in all, it was a great day with so much to do for all participants.

Friday June 17 - Home layout tours, operating Hotel layouts, Swap-A-Rama, Clinics, Model Contest Viewing and Voting, Public Train Show, and General Jackson Showboat.

Wow. What a Day! There was so much to do for the model railroaders. Having my N Trak Module included in a layout at a National Convention and being able run one of my steam locomotives on the layout fulfilled a personal bucket list item for me. I extend a sincere and heartfelt "Thank you" to the Nashville and Georgia N Trak Clubs for making that possible. This type of fellowship is one of the major rewards of this hobby. A side note about my module; two N-Scale dinosaurs were hiding on "Mud Holler."

The Swap-A-Rama was huge. Multiple major manufacturers were represented including but not limited to: ScaleTrains, Micro-Trains-Line, Kato, Intermountain and Broadway Limited Imports. Following the announcement from ScaleTrains at TVRM on Tuesday, Fox Valley displayed its product as part of the ScaleTrains booth. The attendee only Swap-A Rama was scheduled from 9 am till Noon and followed by a Public Show from Noon till 4 pm. (#8 & #9) The turnout for these events was fantastic and





many modelers went home with treasures and special finds. My prizes included a mid-50's fire truck kit and a couple of SRR cabooses. Thanks to all the vendors and manufacturers who presented.



As mentioned above, all three hotel layouts were available for viewing/operating and were well received. There were a wonderful and varied selection of trains operating on the layouts, and many owners/club members were present to discuss their modules and trains. I've been an N Trak modeler for several years and never really understood the attraction of T-Trak and FreeMoN formats. While I'm not ready to move away from the N Trak standard, I am very impressed with the potential shown by the other two standards.

Today there were six clinics scheduled in one-hour blocks between 10 am and 4 pm with a one hour break for lunch. They covered a variety of subjects ranging from scenery, lighting, operations and manufacturing. I attended two:

SC.

One on modeling Paper and Pulp Mills, and another on what it takes to identify, plan, schedule and produce a piece of rolling stock. The ones I selected were well presented and well attended.

The Model Contest entries were available for viewing and voting between 9 am and 4 pm. There were 37 entries in 9 different categories covering motive power, rolling

stock, vehicles, and diorama. I was impressed by the range of items modeled and the amount of time and effort invested in the majority of entries. My favorites included a Camel back 0-8-0 (#10) and a most impressive model of the complete Rexall Train of 1936. Unfortunately I have not been able to find out the winners of the different categories, but all entrants should be proud of participating in this event and being able to showcase their skills and dedication.

The final event on Friday was a cruise on the Cumberland River aboard the General Jackson Showboat. This cruise included stunning views, a delicious

meal, and "toe-tapping" entertainment.

Saturday June 18, Operating Hotel Layouts, Public Show, more Clinics, and the Convention Banquet

This was the final opportunity to operate on the Hotel Layouts, attend clinics, and haggle for that last bargain at the Public Show. There were six more clinics scheduled from 10 am to 3 pm. A variety of sessions included: Building a spline car kit, teaching skills to the next generation, Wi-Fi throttles, Layout detailing, and Operations. I attended three: Wi-Fi Throttles, Detailing, and Operations. Like yesterday I found them to be informative, well presented and well attended. Then it was time to make one more pass through the Public Show and head over to the N Trak layout and run a final train before teardown.

The final event on Saturday evening was the Convention Banquet and Awards. Pressing personal business prevented me from attending this event.

Sunday June 19, Manufacturer's Breakfast

The last event of the convention was a Manufacturer's Breakfast hosted by ScaleTrains. It was an opportunity for manufacturers to make announcements about their latest products and other development news from the leaders in N-Scale model railroading. Again, commitments prevented me from attending this event.

The end of the track

After being an N-Scale Modeler for 45 years, this was the first time I have been able to attend a convention/conference dedicated to N-Scale. It was an experience that I will always remember in a positive manner. It was well organized with a variety of subjects and activities. Thanks to NSE and the committee who planned it, the volunteers who provided the muscle to make it happen, and to Shane Wilson and the folks at ScaleTrains for their ongoing support of this great hobby. A special thanks Craig Barrow, a valued friend and my event roommate who had to tolerate me. And finally, thanks to my wife, Ellen, who understands you never outgrow your need for trains.

Making a Small Photo Booth by Peter Banks

This all got started when I started to work on my AP Achievement for Author. After reading several articles and the requirements for this next step, I realized that I needed an easy way to take pictures.

They would have to be as clear and definitive as is possible. That lead me to the creation of a photo booth. I wanted it to be easy to store and large enough to mask any unwanted background effects, as well as small.

The tools needed were a small drill,



a set of drill bits, a screwdriver and pencil.

As a result of my search, I went to Hobby Lobby and there I found art canvas

16"x 20" and white fabric (#1). You can

get them at any art supply store. In Home Depot, I got flat hinges (1 package of 2 hinges), the type used on folding table legs (#2).



After removing the packaging, I drilled the pivot rivet out (#3) of each hinge, using your drill with a 3/16" bit place,




next on one set of hinge sides drill the dimple closest to the opposite end and on the others drill the dimples furthest from the end.

Please notice, I've included 8=washers to be placed between the hinges and the canvas when assembled.

Next, I placed two canvases face to

face and the third face up under them for drilling and assembly. (#4)

Using your drill, with a 1/8" bit, drill one hole on the top canvas (on 16"

¾" from

corner
of the
canvas
(#6).



Next drill a 1/8" hole in each of the four corners 3/8" from the corner (#7).




The bottom canvas is the center of the booth, and the other two canvas are the sides.

Now use the screws provided and place the hinge halves with pivot holes in the bottom canvas (ensuring you have matching halves for both ends). Next connect the left side hinge halves to the 4 ¾" hole that lines up with the drilled dimple hole and use the other hinge halves for the other side next turn the stack around and attach the hinge halves in the same manner. Picture (#8) will help you if you are confused.



When complete, it opens to a threesided photo booth. You can use it to take pictures in it or as a small display board for pictures, or a supporting background effect (#9).



The white fabric is used under the booth to ensure a totally consistent color background and to block a stray light ray from interfering with taking a picture. I used LED lights for back lighting, they can be clipped to the hinges to give back lighting.

You can try several lighting aspects to get the results you want. I've had good and bad results with my pictures. I've been advised to take numerous pictures to ensure you get a favorable shot at the angle and lighting effect that you want. SER



We were at the Hub City Railroad Museum for their Train




Day event with both our Division table and our T-TRAK HO layout. With a grant from the NMRA National we have been able to add 7 modules to

vention. This train is funded by state of Illinois, operated several round trips daily by Amtrak and features new single level Venture passenger cars built by Siemens.




